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A comparative-literature scholar with a PhD in Hebrew Literature (2010) from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and postdoc from the Simon Dubnow Institute at Leipzig University (2010-2012) supported by Minerva Fellowship (Max-Planck Society), I am teaching at the Department of Hebrew and Comparative Literature at the University of Haifa. With Dr. Lior Levy, I was responsible for establishing the first BA program in Israel for Philosophy and Literature, funded by Yad Ha-Nadiv.

I have authored two books: a study of literary representations of Jewish belonging in contemporary European literature (with Susanne Zepp) (Vandenhoeck & Ruprecht, 2009) and an examination of Lea Goldberg's early writings (Magnes, 2016).

I am currently working on two research projects. A book-length project explores the literary representations of historical narratives and spatio-temporal configurations in contemporary post-Soviet authors writing in German. The second, part of an international collaboration entitled "In their Surroundings: Localizing Jewish Modern Literatures in Eastern Europe" (together with Prof. Yfaat Weiss, Prof. Sabine Koller and PD Efrat Gal-Ed) supported by the GIF Foundation, seeks to incorporate local and spatial perspectives into the study of Hebrew and Yiddish literatures in Eastern Europe, enabling the study of the latter as regional phenomena.
